


Cohabitation and Marriage

New research on the attitudes of Americans toward cohabitation and marriage reveals some disappointing things. The Pew Research Center now finds that more young adults have cohabitated than have married. As behavior follows attitudes, Pew has also discovered that 69% of Americans believe that it is acceptable for an unmarried couple to live together even if they don't get married. I think we should seriously consider that staggering number. According to Gallup 41% of all Americans identify themselves as "born-again" or "evangelical". It doesn't take a math wizard to see that those numbers bleed together. In other words, there is a large number of believers who seem to be fine with cohabitation. Only 14% of the population holds a biblical view on the issue stating that cohabitation with a partner outside of marriage is "never acceptable". What do we make of such shocking numbers even among believers in the church?

I want to be clear in writing this article that I do not expect people who do not have a relationship with Christ to live as they do have one. I think this is a mistake the church has been making for a long time. We no longer live in a Christian culture, if we ever truly did. Expecting those who do not have a relationship with Jesus to live a moral lifestyle is a fool's errand. The bible makes it clear that those who are lost are in darkness, they prefer the darkness over the light. Our work in sharing Christ to those who are in darkness will put us in a position of dealing with lives that are messy and out of line with the Word of God. A changed heart comes before anyone can ever begin to address change in lifestyle. My disappointment is not with those



who are lost, it is with those who say they are born again. Even if we discount those who are still spiritually immature in their faith, I think it is reasonable to expect a higher number of believers to hold to a biblical understanding of sexuality and marriage. Our retreat in this area is not only immoral, it is tragic. Even from a practical point of view all available research tells us that those who cohabitate before marriage are more likely to divorce. A 2018 study published in the Journal of Marriage and Family states that the "premarital cohabitation effect", cohabitation negatively impacts divorce rates, is still alive and well. In accepting cohabitation we continue to set our sons and daughters up for not only moral failure, but also marital failure.

Marriage is a godly institution that deserves our willingness to defend it. We live in time where biblical standards are ridiculed and openly despised. Our response is not in vitriol or anger, but in faithful adherence and practice of what is good before God. Defending the biblical ethic on marriage and sexuality begins with God's people. We must and we can show the great benefit of following the Lord's standards in these areas. We must model our relationships expectation and practice for our children and grandchildren. In faithfully following Christ in sexuality and marriage we have the opportunity to offer a different way and a fulfilling family life to those who are suffering and living with the pain of broken promises and broken.
