




70th Anniversary Celebration

Maui by Jean Rosenow



I wanted to write this article for two reasons; the first is to praise God for you, my church family. Larry and I flew to Oahu on August 2nd to attend some activities that ended in the wedding of my oldest great niece. Then we flew to Kauai (the opposite direction from Maui). We helped take care of my two brothers ages 84 and 88 who have some health problems. It was hot and humid (no air conditioning in the house!), so when the strong winds of Hurricane Dora came, it cooled us down a bit and the surfers were enjoying the big waves, but I started to get some odd text messages and emails. "Jean are you okay?" "Jean, are you and Larry and your family safe?" Then the realization of the Maui fires came with the text, "Jean, where are you? I hope you are not on Maui where the fires are." (We could have been because Maui is one of our favorite places to vacation.) The first Sunday we were back at Nall, so many of you told us "We are glad you are safely home. We were worried about you." So, thank you for showing us love and concern and for your love and concern for the people of Maui.

Secondly, since you expressed your love and concern for the people of Maui, I want to share with you what I learned when we attended the Eleele Baptist church the Sunday after the fires. The Directors of the Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention shared the following in a video. They said the first thing people can do is pray. God is our power. Recovery will take months, perhaps years. Pray for the Lahaina Baptist Church. The church was damaged, but mostly still standing. I'm sure the members have many challenges ahead. There are many things that need to be done. I was glad to see Maui on our prayer list. Keep Maui on your prayer list. You can get updates by going to hpbaptist.net.

The next thing they need are volunteers, but do not go on your own. You need to be invited so they have the right kind of help. (They are very organized and well trained for disaster relief and highly regarded by the local governments.) Many states have volunteered to help already.

People often want to send supplies. It isn't that the Disaster Relief doesn't want supplies, they want people to know what is needed so they don't have too much of one thing and not enough of another. The best thing is to send money. Baptist churches are already sending money. The Eleele Baptist Church (a small church) decided that since they didn't have a big amount to send right away, to put it in their budget for next year. The pastor also mentioned that when churches give money to the Cooperative Program, there is money going to Disaster Relief. God has blessed us with good leadership to have wisdom to provide for this.

On Sunday September 3, Pastor Bob taught us from 1 Peter 5:5-14. His third point was: We should love the family of God (Nall) and the world (Maui). I thought, how appropriate, you are doing it! (The parentheses are mine). Pastor Bob, we do listen to your wonderful lessons from God's word!
